Parker re-elected as Warden

PICTOU – Robert Parker has been re-elected by his fellow councillors to serve as Warden of the Municipality of Pictou County for the next four years.

The Municipality of Pictou County's Swearing-In Ceremony and election of Warden and Deputy Warden took place during the Nov. 6, 2024 Council Meeting which was held at the deCoste Performing Arts Centre in Pictou.

"I am honoured to have been re-elected, by my fellow councillors, as Warden for the Municipality of Pictou County for a third term," Parker said. "I look forward to working together around our Council table to make sound and fiscally responsible decisions on behalf of all our rural residents."

Parker, who represents District 6 on Council has been a councillor for the Municipality of Pictou County since 2008 and has served as Warden since 2016.

"I will always work hard for the citizens of our rural Municipality when leading our Council, from Lismore to River John, from Mt. Thom to Caribou and all communities in between," he said.

What is Imagine MOPC?

In September 2023, the Municipality of Pictou County (MOPC) launched "Imagine MOPC", a project to develop a municipality-wide Municipal Planning Strategy (MPS) and Land Use Bylaw (LUB) for the Municipality of Pictou County. Currently, there is no land use planning in MOPC with the exception of the Wind Energy Bylaw and the Subdivision Bylaw. In 2018, the Provincial Government passed new legislation that requires every municipality to adopt land use rules that meet newly established minimum planning standards. The Imagine MOPC project will bring MOPC into compliance with this provincial mandate.



Insurance Impact

QUESTION: Who decides where it is safe to live and work?

ANSWER: Ultimately, Mother Nature and the insurance industry will likely determine where it's safe to live and work.

As climate change affects which parts of the County may flood or burn, insurance costs will impact future property values and locations. Owners of properties in floodplains, on eroding coastlines, or near woodlands may face higher insurance rates or lose coverage entirely.

North American insurers in places like California and Florida have already stopped covering high-risk areas due to hurricanes, wildfires, and floods.

Nova Scotia had the highest insured losses in Canada in 2023 and the second highest in 2022. The Insurance Bureau of Canada reported payouts of \$581 million in 2022 and \$611 million in 2023.

A survey found that 92% of business leaders believe extreme weather is now normal and expect climate-related damage this year.

Should the County allow more development in risky areas, or let the insurance industry decide where affordable housing and businesses can go? The risk is discovering too late that insurance coverage has been dropped.



Planning ahead

To address these issues, the MOPC plans to:

- Develop new by-laws to discourage building in floodplains and erosion-prone areas.
- Add these by-law requirements to the MOPC Municipal Planning Strategy.
- Collaborate with nearby counties to create consistent land use by-laws along the Northumberland Strait.

An unhealthy change

Climate change has an impact on health


Climate change makes natural hazards like storms, floods, and heatwaves worse, leading to injuries and health problems like heart and lung diseases.

Vulnerable groups, including Indigenous peoples and rural residents, face greater risks due to less infrastructure and existing challenges.

Water quality and quantity are affected by changes in precipitation and temperature. This can threaten drinking water, increase waterborne diseases, and cause injuries from heavy rainfall.

Air pollution also worsens due to climate change, with wildfires and more pollen contributing to poorer air quality. This affects people with conditions like asthma or heart disease, especially the elderly and children.

Extreme weather events like floods can also harm indoor air quality.



Mental health can suffer from both short-term events like hurricanes and long-term changes like sea-level rise. These disruptions can cause fear, grief, anxiety, and weaken community bonds.

What can be done?

Improve health services and safety measures to protect people from these impacts.

Landfill Vouchers from the MOPC are available from May 1st to Nov. 30th.

Vouchers are given free of charge to people who own homes or cottages in rural Pictou County. Vacant landowners, wood lot owners, etc, do not qualify for such vouchers. Each voucher will cover the tipping fee for up to 250 kg of garbage at the Mount William Transfer Station. They can be used individually or in combination for a maximum total of 1,000 kg.
